A Roller Coaster

No, I'm not about to advocate a trip to Flamingo Land or Lightwater Valley, though if anyone fancies it, I'm more than willing to join you — when we're allowed. What I'm really thinking about is the roller coaster of emotions that lies ahead of us. The journey from Palm Sunday, through Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, to Easter Sunday takes us from excitement through puzzlement, solemnity and sorrow to the exultation, celebration and deep joy of Easter Day. Is it a journey you will be ready to make? As this is Matthew's year in the lectionary, you may want to read his account of the week in chapters 21 to 28.

It is not an easy journey to make; indeed there may be some years when our circumstances are such that the journey is too painful, too emotionally close to where we are. This year, the coming weeks are going to take us on a journey that we are likely to find difficult. It may feel as if Easter, the resurrection, is somewhat delayed, as corona virus keeps us at a physical distance from one another. At the moment if feels as if we're in for a long Lent.

This year, as in some other years, we may feel stuck on Good Friday, or in the waiting of Holy Saturday. Sometimes our own journey coincides with that of the church year and we are sad on Good Friday and joyful on Easter Day. At other times, we may find our Easter joy arrives at another point in the year – and I think that may well be the case this year. We may

be surprised by where and how God meets us – what glimpse of resurrection we might see, even in our current circumstances.

May you find your way with Jesus to the Cross, and beyond, to the joy of the resurrection, even if it doesn't fall on Easter Day. *Helen*

THE SIDE OF LEEDS THAT HAS MORE FOOD BANKS THAN CO-OPS

The above headline appeared early in March on the Evening Post website. In a sad indictment of today's society, more children than ever before are being fed from Food Banks, Susie Beever reports:-

A cold winters morning in February, and a warm hubbub feeling fills the room in a Methodist Church in Hunslet. In a corner a boy swings his legs from a chair while an elderly women reads a copy of Aladdin to him. Mothers are seen balancing toddlers on hips while a shelf in the corner is adorned with nappies and baby food. This is not a Play-Group, it is a Food Bank. "You should have been here last week" volunteer Margaret Woodward says, "the shelves were empty, it was so busy". Some 43% of children living in this part of Leeds are living in poverty, according to the latest Government data. The Leeds Central Constituency, which includes part of inner south Leeds, has the ninth

highest rate of child poverty in the country, when you exclude housing costs.

In the South and East part of Leeds the Food Bank has 10 distribution centres, with a further 2 opening in the spring. A quick calculation shows that there are more Food Banks than Co-op branches. The number has increased from just 2 in 2013, with staff saying the main reason for this is the introduction of Universal Credit the same year.

But the volunteers say that most people walking through the door are not collecting emergency food parcels simply because of delayed payments or benefit sanctions; in fact most are employed, but their low wages versus rising cost of living are leaving them, and more importantly their children, without food on the table.

The 4 year old's mother, Rachael, has 2 other children, her youngest being 2. Rachael, 30, claims she has been forced to shop lift nappies during the weeks she is unable to afford extras after paying her rent, bills and feeding the children. "I'm on universal credit" she says, adding "since I have been on it, it's just a nightmare. There is nothing left to buy the things I want for the kids. I'll admit to have shop-lifted nappies. I have been in Morrisons some weeks and put nappies in the trolley and realised I could not afford them, so sneak out with them. If it weren't for this place, there would be nowhere else to get food from. The kids think it is a supermarket".

Another mum, Emma, who is 30, says that her son does not know she comes here. "I feel really cheeky coming here when there are people worse off" she says, "but my son is my life, I always make sure he is fed and clothed before me". Emma has been unable to work since autumn due to severe illness but claims that even when in work as a cleaner she struggles to meet the financial demands of life.

Numbers calculated by the collection of vouchers at the Food Bank, reveal that 4,579 individual children from this small pocket of Yorkshire, have been fed from a Food Bank between April 1st 2019 until the beginning of February 2020. By the end of March, when the count is refreshed, this figure will have likely far surpassed the figure from the previous year when 5,125 children used the service.

FOOTNOTE: Cross Gates Methodist Church started a monthly collection of food/toiletries in November 2017. Our contribution in March was 91.74Kg. <u>PTO to see how we can continue to help.</u>
