There will be various joys and sorrows we will have experienced. Some of us will be out and about mixing sooner than others; some will have been out working or caring throughout lockdown. There isn't a right or wrong way to have experienced the last 6 months. There isn't a right or wrong way to experience the next 6 months. Be patient with one another, accepting of our differences. Be patient as we all continue learning how to live in this changed world.

One new thing for the start of the year – church council has met and agreed our first service in the building at Cross Gates Methodist Church will be 27th September. It will look quite different to what we were used to, and more information will be coming out in the next week or so. If, by 6th September, you haven't received a letter telling you about re-opening and

you want to come along on the 27th, please get in touch with Helen White or Barbara Lloyd and we will make sure you get a copy. Other groups and activities will have different start dates – some may not meet again in the building until after Christmas.

So what will this new Methodist year be like? Different to the last one – just as the school year will be for staff and pupils. Hopefully it will be a time of returning and new starts – but there are likely to be downs as well as ups; things we have to stop doing, as well as things we can start. The one thing we can be sure of is this: God is with us in all of it.

Re-opening of Church

The Church Council has met and agreed the risk assessment and associated planning and preparation. We are aiming to have our first service back in the building on September 27th. We won't be worshipping at Cross Gates every week just yet, so the September service will be just the start of reopening and more information will follow about which weeks we will worship at Cross Gates. Numbers will be limited, just as they are in shops, and you may well need to queue to get in. We will send you further details nearer the time about what to expect.

It would help our planning if you could indicate to Barbara or Helen whether you hope to come to worship in the building on 27th September.

Over the coming months, we will continue to circulate Worship at Home sheets weekly to those who would like them, and to offer worship over Zoom most weeks, alongside beginning to use the building.

The History of Methodism in Cross Gates (Part One)

John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, was born in **1703**, he travelled about 5,000 miles per year and preached all over the British Isles. During his 56 years as a preacher it is estimated he journeyed 250,000 miles, most of it on horseback, and preached 40,000 sermons. He would read and write in his journal as he rode along.

His journal records that:

Saturday, 25 July, 1761

About one I preached at Seacroft, and found several who believed God had saved them from sin.

The first Methodist Chapel in Seacroft was erected in **1751**, part of the original wall remains to this day.

No doubt, people from the neighbouring village of Cross Gates were amongst those who listened to the preaching of John Wesley at Seacroft and joined in the fellowship of

the small Methodist Society week by week. There would not be many of them for the village of Cross Gates was very small and nearly a hundred years after the beginning of Methodism in Seacroft there were still only about 35 cottages in Cross Gates, Manston and Stanks together.

In the late **1860's** a group of Methodists was meeting in the cottage of Mrs. Colley in Station Road and later at William Fall's house in The Orchards. The members of this group started to hold services in a thatched cottage on Austhorpe Road.

This cottage, the home of Thomas Taylor, stood opposite the present Methodist Church - it was the people who attended the cottage services who conceived the idea of building a Methodist Church in Cross Gates over a hundred years ago.

By the year **1876** Cross Gates was growing, the population in that year was estimated at about 749 and

there were 200 children attending the school. The Cross Gates Methodists decided the time had come to build a church and on 24 January 1876 the building fund was started (first collection £1. 1s. 0d).

Year of Prayer

The Methodist Conference has declared 2020/2021 a year of prayer where Church-wide commitments to evangelism, church growth, church at the margins, pioneering and church planting will flow from a deep, contemplative orientation to God's grace and love.

"<u>Prayer</u> is the raising of one's mind and heart to God," wrote Saint John Damascene. Whether we are speaking with words or sitting in silence, prayer is time spent mindfully in God's presence. Prayer is, quite simply, being with God.

It sounds so straightforward, even effortless. What could be more natural than spending time with the God who created us, who loves us, and who holds us in existence? And yet, we know from experience that prayer does not always feel natural. In fact, it can be hard work.

Prayer requires discipline, motivation, and even creativity. We may find ourselves approaching our prayer lives as we do other difficult tasks like exercising and eating right. We may start out strong and then slowly lose enthusiasm. We may be disappointed in the results of our hard work and gradually give up.

Even if we are dedicated to prayer and keep at it despite its inevitable challenges, we can easily find ourselves in a prayer rut. We may feel that we are not progressing in our spiritual lives or experiencing the "spark" we might expect from spending time in God's dynamic presence.

Whether you are trying to get into a regular habit of prayer or looking for ways to enhance your existing prayer life, trying new ways to pray can be beneficial.
