In December, our Church - with help from Tranquility Court - donated 14 containers of food/toiletries to the food bank distribution centre. This was the largest monthly amount we have given.

We are told by the Manager that any type of tinned food/toiletries can be used and everything is distributed. However, at the moment they are short of *coffee, tinned potatoes and vegetables, tinned fish, tinned meat, tinned custard, tinned rice pudding, dilute/long life juice.*

Dignity in Destitution

Leeds Destitute Asylum-seekers Support

What a year 2020 turned out to be. LEDAS (Leeds Destitute Asylumseekers Support) came about from discussions in meetings held in early May, so that a constitution, a business plan and an application to the Charity Commission were submitted and in record time, in June, we were granted Charitable status.

From then on we networked and forged links with many other charities and agencies working for the same client group. Eventually, after the initial lease for the hostel was extended from the original 6 months to the end of November; LEDAS together with Leeds City Council and PAFRAS (Positive Action for Refugees and Asylum Seekers) drew up an agreement for us to work together, in the best interests of the group of the men who had to leave the hostel.

Exactly 8 months to the day, since the Council took the men into their care, on the 25th November we moved them back into our care, in 2 houses in Harehills, Leeds, preventing them from becoming street homeless. We feel we are moving towards our residents having the opportunity to live independently, for example, they are enjoying having privacy, a key to the door and being able to cook for themselves, what they want and when they want to eat. They have the time to gather new evidence whilst pursuing their claim for leave to remain. Once successful, we can then look at new referrals to our houses.

This is just the beginning of our work, as these properties, from two private landlords, are short term lets. Currently we are exploring a more permanent solution and looking for suitable accommodation. Fundraising is always a perennial task but with the current climate it is proving more difficult. We are looking for two 4 bedroom properties in Leeds that ideally could be donated or bought for our use and perhaps let to us on a peppercorn rent. We would maintain them internally, provide insurance and pay the utilities. We have received many offers of help both financially and practically; it is humbling knowing that others want to be involved too.

Memories of Kath Harwood

You wondered if we had any memories of Kath Harwood and one that makes me laugh, is when Kath came to the Ladies Friendship to tell us about going to Palestine to visit the orphanages, with money tucked in her knickers! Also how she gave the Israeli border guards a bit of what she thought too! Just the other month something came up about Palestine and how their industries are being depleted and I bought a scarf made in Palestine, only two places now able to make them. Appropriately the pattern is called Bethlehem. *Pauline Brown*

Kathleen and I grew up together. Kath's parents and maternal grandmother were friends in their younger days with my parents, and grandparents, attending Woodhouse Street Methodist Church. One of my many memories of times spent with both Kath and her sister Margaret, was Christmas carol rehearsals at Youth Club on the two Friday evenings before Christmas Eve. Kath's father, Arthur and Mother May, both of whom latterly were members of Cross Gates, came to Youth Club to help us sing "properly" before we went out and on Christmas Eve about 20 of us duly went out. Kath and Margaret both had tuning forks to meet us in tune and Kath conducted. At Easter we went on Club hikes with Kath leading the singing all round the Dales. Happy Days. *Mary Teal*

1962 – I started teaching in Sunday School when I was sixteen. Kath (the Evans) and her husband were new to our Church and we were both in Juniors. She asked me if I would babysit for them so I went with my boyfriend (Mel Thomas, son of Godfrey and Dorothy Thomas) to their house in Manston to look after their children. So sorry to hear of Kath's passing. *Gill Thomas*

Kath had a camper van when she was a single parent with three young children. It was not easy so she put a notice up on the caravan site asking if any other single parents had problems. To her surprise she received many replies and a group was formed. This even resulted in one (or more) weddings. She was also a 'Street Angel' in Central Leeds on a Saturday evening. *Beryl Gledhill*

My memory of Kath Harwood ((Mrs Evans as I always knew her) was one particular day in the school holidays when I was probably about 10 or 11 years old. I and some other members of Junior Church spent what seemed like hours in the School Room with her practising the Zither Carol. I can still see her standing in front of us, she was elevated, I think she was standing on a chair and trying to get us to sing the carol in a way that she approved of. Each time we sang a couple of lines she would shout STOP and then demonstrate the correct way to sing it pronouncing every word precisely. I just remember it taking ages and I'm not sure she was entirely satisfied with the end result. I still think of her fondly when I sing the Zither Carol and still not sure I can sing it the 'Kath Harwood' way. *Jennifer Heap*

My memory of Kath Harwood goes back to 1966 or thereabouts. We had to meet at 'The Gem' (now Chiltern mills and Mecca Bingo). We were about a dozen JMA collectors from Crossgates Methodist Sunday School and Kath was taking us to the JMA rally at Oxford Place Chapel in the centre of Leeds. Going on a bus to town without our parents was exciting enough but being with all those children from other Methodist Churches for an afternoon of activities then sharing a final act of worship is something I have never forgotten. *Linda Booth*

We admired Kath for her enthusiasm in everything she was involved. She was the conscience of our Church and to her **PEOPLE MATTERED.** She was never afraid to speak out for Women's Rights, Refugees, the Homeless, Under Privileged, Palestine, Sabeel and PAFRAS. In addition, there was the music she brought to our Church and local area - both in worship and Concerts. Her wisdom and faith shone through in our meetings and study groups. Spotlight on..... Linda Booth

During this period when we are forced to be apart from each other we thought that it would be interesting to find out a little more about one other. So every month we will be putting the spotlight on a different member of our congregation.

I have lived my entire life within a mile of Crossgates Methodist Church. I have attended the Church for almost 60 years and been a confirmed member for nearly 50 years. As a child I was part of a large and thriving Sunday School which in the early sixties took place on a Sunday afternoon. We would only join in a full Church service on special occasions like Harvest Festival, Church Anniversary and Prizegiving. I progressed through Sunday School becoming a JMA collector and joining the Brownies and Junior Youth Club. By the age of 15 I had completed my "training" and become a Sunday School teacher myself, starting in the Upper Juniors with a class of around 8 children in a department of around 40! I was already helping at Brownies and went on to qualify as a Young Leader when I was 17.

After completing my A Levels I spent 15 months away from Crossgates when I lived and worked in Horton-in-Ribblesdale in the Yorkshire Dales. Crossgates was still my home Church though and I made a surprise visit home in September 1975 to see the Young People's Department production of Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat which I would have been a part of if I had not gone away to work.

As many of you know the Young People's Department of Junior Church flourished during the 70s and early 80s with more than 70 teenagers filling the gallery on a Sunday morning and attending Youth Club on a Friday night. Sometimes members of the group shared in the leading of worship and each year we organised a Christmas party and summer outing for disadvantaged children from the local area. I was privileged to be part of the team leading this group. The highlight of the year was the annual youth weekend in Scarborough. We took over the Methodist Guest House, The Cliff and shared in activities and discussion groups which all led to a deepening of our faith and a resolve to "grow up to be what we were meant to be". On Sunday morning we spent an hour in silence which everyone respected and then shared an informal Communion Service.

Around this time I found myself continually being "volunteered" for other roles in Church Life. I was voted on to the Church Council then elected as

a rep to the Circuit meeting. In 1978 I represented the Circuit at the District Synod. I won't go on to list all the various jobs I have had at Crossgates Church. I am sure my story is very similar to that of most people who have lived their whole life as a Methodist.

In 1986 I was married at Crossgates and in 1989 and1991 respectively my daughters were baptised here. While my children were growing up it was not always easy to attend evening meetings so my commitments changed to helping at coffee mornings and baking for events and other job's connected with Children's activities. In 1995 I returned to Guiding as Brown Owl and worked towards my Pack Holiday License so that the pack could have annual residential trips away. I was still on the Church Council throughout these years and had been asked several times over the years if I would consider becoming a Steward. In 2005 the time seemed right to say yes and I served what was then the standard 4 year term and returned a couple of years later to do an additional year as Senior Steward.

In 2007 I was called to take on the role of Meeting Point Treasurer. As well as the bookkeeping, this involved working on a small committee to manage all aspects of the café project including the letting of the upstairs flat. I did this job for 10 years and learned a great deal about the problems and concerns of the people of Harehills.

Whilst writing this brief history of my Methodist journey I have been reminded of how thankful I am for the love and support I have received from our Church Family throughout the years.
