Crowds

I'm writing this on the day the Prime Minister told us it would be at least four more weeks before the restrictions could be lifted. I'm guessing some folk will be relieved and some frustrated. We're also working our way through Mark's Gospel during June. There are quite a number of scenes involving a crowd gathering. Think of the 5,000 gathered who shared 5 loaves and 2 fish; the crowd who followed Jesus round the lake; who brought people to be healed; the crowd gathered round Jesus when the woman reached out and touched him. Still to come at the moment are the entry into Jerusalem, the trial before Pilate and the crucifixion.

Each of those crowds probably felt a little bit different. Some crowds are good to be part of - there's a sense of excitement; a shared joy in music or sport. Others can be scary - when violence starts at a football match; when you are small and can't see over the people; when the crowd seems to have a mind of its own, sweeping you along where you didn't intend to go.

I think that it's going to be like that as restrictions ease. Sometimes we'll find it exciting. We may find joy in sharing an event with others, especially if it's something we've been missing or that's been much anticipated. At other times we may find it a bit scary - after all, we're not used to being part of a crowd. We could remind ourselves what Jesus said to the disciples as he walked across the water to them: "Courage!" he said.

"It is I. Don't be afraid!" (Mark 6:51b). We can remind ourselves that crowds can be good. But I think we will also need to be patient with ourselves, and with one another.

However you find the next weeks of restrictions, and the eventual easing, may you know Jesus with you, giving the peace only he can give.

So every month we will be putting the spotlight on a different member of our congregation. This month we are again lucky enough to have two contributors.

A bit about me! I was born in Devonport, Plymouth in 1947 and this city had been badly bombed in the war. My mum's parents were Cornish but had lived in Plymouth when my mum was born. My grandad had been in the Royal Navy, on HMS Hood. He had been on her from the early 1920's and went on what was called the World Tour. He did finish for a few years through some illness but was called up again in the beginning of the WW2 on board HMS Hood again. A week before the Hood was sunk, he had been transferred to another ship; he had known all the sailors who lost their lives Grandad lived till he was 94.

My dad was in the Royal Marines and from Leeds; that is how he met my mum. We came up to Leeds in 1955ish. At first we lived down York Road where the Irish Centre is now, then moving to Halton and Seacroft. I have four sisters and four brothers, I am the eldest. There were just me and my two sisters, Jeannette and Christine when we first moved to Leeds. I married my late husband in 1969 at St. Wilfred's, Halton. David had been an altar boy and that is how I met David. After we married we moved a few times through his job. We then moved back to Leeds and then I found Crossgates Methodist Church, joining with Janet Blyth in about 1991, I think. We had both been going to the Ladies Friendship a while.

Our Minister Joyce Nicholson joined and started the Nativity service. Joyce had asked for volunteers to make shepherd/Angel costumes and I volunteered. I made two dozen and I believe some are still in use. My legs ached for a good while after as I just had a trusty treadle machine!

There have been some really happy meetings over the years and sadly a good few old friends now gone. Hopefully the ones I call friends at Crossgates now will still be around when we can all get together again.

I was born in Middleton in 1936. We went to Wilson Street Chapel in Hunslet where I went to Sunday School and at 7 years old was **told** that I would sing a solo at Sunday School prize-giving, which was two verses and the chorus of a hymn. Mum worked in Dial Street which meant 2 trams so when I was 8 we got an exchange to a corporation semi in East End Park and transferred our membership to Zion Chapel. There I went to Sunday School and both Dad and I were in the choir. Dorothy and I have known each other since we were 8 but didn't hit it off until we were in the Youth Club. We married at Newbourne on June 20th 1969 and have been together ever since and have lived in the same house! When our daughter Janet was 2 she joined Cross Gates Sunday School so she could be with her cousins. I have served as a Church Steward and was also in charge of the crèche department. I have sung a lot of solos in Churches and male voice choirs.

Year of Prayer

The Methodist Conference declared 2020/2021 a year of prayer.

Catherine de Hueck Doherty, a Russian immigrant to North America, once wrote a letter to her close friend Dorothy Day in which she described a fascinating way of praying. She told Dorothy that she had been making pilgrimages into her past, stopping here and there along the way to thank God for the joys and sorrows of her life.

She wrote, "Short as my life is, as any human life is, there are, strange to say, many a shrine in it before which, as is the custom of my people, I can bow low from the waist, touching the earth with my hands, and singing alleluias in my heart for each."

Consider taking your own pilgrimages into the past. Visit the shrines in your life—the places, relationships, and times when God was present, although you may not have noticed him. Stop along the way, thanking God, asking him for healing, or "singing alleluias" in his presence.

Remember, God is eternal, and all moments are equally present to him. The God who described himself as "the one who is and who was and who is to come" (Rv 1:8) is present in your past. Why not worship him there?

Pray with Gospel stories.

The Gospels are the very heart of our sacred Scriptures, and provide fertile ground for prayer. Read one of the stories, imagining yourself in that Gospel scene. Look around you and notice details. Try to engage all of your senses. What are you feeling? What do you want to say to Jesus? What does Jesus say to you?

This practice of prayerfully using your God-given imagination is a way of bringing to life the stories that make you a Christian and a follower of Christ. It can help you engage with Jesus and his message in a powerful, life-changing way.

The daughter of a Minister asked her mother: 'Why does daddy pray to God before he preaches?' Her mother replied: 'He asks God to help him.' A cloud came across the little girl's face and she said: 'Why doesn't he then?' **Appreciation** Amanda, Alison and Andrea would like to thank everyone for the cards and messages of sympathy received following the death of their Dad, Peter.
