Changes, patience, and prayers

I think I've written before about September being a new start. This year, there are a few things that have prompted me to think about that again. Firstly, this circuit of Leeds North and East has new co-superintendents from 1st September: Revds George Bailey and Tanya Short. Secondly, the group of churches with which I work has grown to include Christ Church, Halton. Both of these changes will need us to be patient, to pray for one another and to be prepared to do things differently. The third change is the continuing transition to living with Covid 19 in as safe a way as possible, whilst getting on with some semblance of normal life. As I write, we have made some changes at Cross Gates, such as not needing to book in order to attend worship, and being able to sing the final hymn behind our masks. The small group with responsibility to making decisions about our Covid related responses meet again between me writing this and you receiving it. I expect there will be further changes, as we ease the restrictions, whilst trying to keep people safe.

I don't know about you, but in some ways, I find this stage more difficult than when we were in lock down. At least in lockdown, and when we were living under legal restrictions about distancing, mask wearing and self isolation, we knew where we were. Now, we have to make our own decisions. It strikes me as a bit like the changes Paul writes about for those who follow Christ, compared to those who followed the Jewish faith. For the Jews, they lived by the law, including strict rules about what was and wasn't allowed, for instance what they could and couldn't eat. For Christians, there are no rules, apart from the commandments to love God and to love our neighbour as ourselves. It's these commandments we need to be guided by in the decisions we make. And, as with so many other things, Christians will come to different conclusions about what is right. Here again we will need to be patient, to pray for one another and be prepared to do things differently.

I ask for your patience and your prayers in these changing times.

Church Services

A meeting of the Covid response team for Cross Gates has taken place and the wonderful news is that weekly services in Church will resume in September. In order to keep us all safe, the following restrictions were agreed:

- You will still be asked to sanitise your hands before you come in
- Alternate pews will still be used.
- You can sit where you like in the pews that are open, but we would ask you respect other people's space.
- Masks will be optional in Church during the service, but we ask you to wear one when you are moving about and coming into closer contact with people.
- We will sing all hymns and can stand to sing. Masks again are optional.
- Services will still be approximately 40 minutes long to reduce the length of time we are in contact with others.
- Collections will remain as now, with the baskets at the entrance and then brought forward by a steward during the second hymn.
- We will resume using the hymnal but some recordings will be used.
- Hymn books will be available in the Galilee for you to pick one up if you want one, but they will not be handed out. We ask you to leave it in your pew after the service.
- We would ask that you do not stand and chat in the Galilee either before or after the service. Please wait until you get outside in the fresh air.
- The doors and windows will remain open during the services as ventilation of areas remains a key way of reducing risk.
- After church coffee will not resume yet.

• All the toilets are open but we would ask that you consider everyone's space when passing others in the Wesley room corridor, as it is narrow.

Everyone should now have got all the worship at home sheets for the whole of September. If you want to continue getting them after September, when weekly Sunday services resume, please let me know. We are more than happy for you to carry on getting them if you find it difficult to get to church.

<u>Cross Gates Methodist Church – World War One Memorial</u> (part 1) <u>By Christine Holdstock</u>

On the left-hand wall of the Church there are two memorial plaques commemorating the people of this Church who gave their lives for their country in the two world wars. I have researched the soldiers who are on the First World War Plaque and here is some of the information that I have been able to find. If anyone has any further information about any of these people or their families please let me know.

Fred Atkinson was the son of Thomas and Mary Atkinson, of Crossgates, Leeds. On the 1911 census he was recorded as living at The Green, Crossgates and was an Insurance Clerk, age 22. He died on 3rd September 1916 and he is buried at the Amara War Cemetery in Iraq. He was in the Royal Army Medical Corps. **George Fred Beaumont** was the son of George William and Ann Beaumont, of Rose Cottage, The Orchards, Crossgates. In 1911 he was 20 and working as a clerk, in 1912 he went to



Canada. He enlisted in the Canadian Overseas Expeditionary force on 7th November 1914 in Toronto. He died on 15th September 1916, aged 25 and his name is recorded on the Vimy Memorial, Pas de Calais, France, and also in the Veterans Canada Memorial Book.

Harry Barker Holliday was one of three brothers who all died during the war. They were the sons of William and Mary Jane Holliday, of 126 Austhorpe Rd and were all living there in 1911, then Harry was a clerk. He died on 3rd September 1918, aged 30 and is buried in the Reninghelst New Military Cemetery, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium.



Wilfred Holliday was 20 in 1911 and his occupation was the milk trade and farming. He was killed in action in France on 8th April 1918, age 28 and is buried at the Warloy-Baillon Communal Cemetery.

Clement Holliday worked in a clothiery warehouse and was 17 in 1911. He was killed in action in France, on 29th March 1918, aged 34 and his memorial is at the Pozieres Memorial, Departement de la Somme, Picardie, France.

It's hard to believe that three brothers who lived in Austhorpe Road and came to this Church all died in 1918 serving their country.

Leeds South & East Foodbank

There is concern from the Trussell Trust and 90 other organisations about the proposed cut in Universal credit. A Director of the Trussell Trust has given the following information:-"*The UK Government is planning to cut Universal Credit by* £20 per week from October – for some families this will mean suddenly losing a fifth of their income. Last year the Food Banks in our network gave out 2.5 million parcels and we are concerned this cut will mean even more people will need a Food Bank later this year. *More than a million people say that they will need a Food Bank if this goes ahead.*" In July, our Church plus Tranquility Court, delivered 11 boxes of food/toiletries, weighing approximately 180Kg, plus £60 cash (receipt available) to the Leeds South and East Food Bank Distribution centre. **On the occasions when Church is open there is a basket in the Gallilee to receive your gifts. Making A Will


