

MINISTER: Rev Helen White Easter CROSSGATES METHODIST CHURCH Newsletter April 2022

Are you/have you been waiting for Easter Sunday so your Lenten Fast can end? Is it the chocolate, the biscuits or cake you're looking forward to? Or getting to the end of the Lent book you've been reading? The end of Lent was traditionally associated with certain foods – Hot Cross buns for Good Friday (even though you can now buy them most of the year); eggs and roast lamb for Easter Sunday. Perhaps your family has other foods you associate with Easter, but let's look at those I've mentioned. Hot cross buns first – what do they symbolise? The cross on the bun reminds us of Good Friday, that Jesus died on the cross. Originally there would only have been 5 sultanas representing the 5 wounds of Christ, and the spices included remind us of the spices used to anoint Jesus' body.

Lamb for Easter was a tradition I came across as an adult. Friends had lamb for Easter Sunday dinner for a number of reasons – it was seasonal, being springtime. It can also remind us of Jesus, the Lamb of God and the Passover being celebrated when Jesus had the Last Supper with his disciples.

And finally, the symbol we most often associate with Easter – the one that's been filling the shelves of the shop since Christmas stuff was cleared out – eggs. What do you think about as you choose an Easter

egg to give, or take the one you've been given out of its box and foil? Do you ever stop to think about its association with Easter? The Easter egg is often spoken of as a symbol of new life – the potential for life that is within the egg. But there is more to be seen in it than that. Think about an egg – rather dead looking– even stone like (the ordinary ones that is) – then think of the stone in front of the tomb on Good Friday. Open up your egg (I'm on chocolate ones now) – separate the two halves – what do you see? If its empty, remember the tomb on Easter morning – Jesus' body no longer there because he had risen – new life from death. If there are sweets, more chocolates, a toy or a filling – think of the surprise the friends of Jesus had when they went to the tomb and found the angel telling them that he was risen – a good surprise and a special gift – their friend with them for ever – and with us too. Whichever kind of egg you have at Easter this year, there is something in it to remind us of the events of that first Easter.

May the joy of new life rise in you this Easter. Helen

Memories of Mark Taylor

Jonathan Mark Taylor died on 24th February peacefully in York District Hospital. A beloved son, partner, brother, dad and grandad. Donations in Mark's memory for Shelter because it was a charity he supported.

In the 70s and 80s when I knew Mark Taylor best he was a central part of life at Crossgates Methodist Church. As teenagers and young adults back then we spent so much time at Church that it would be difficult to pinpoint one particular memory but Mark was always involved with what was going on. His laugh would make you feel like you had said the funniest thing ever. He was a true friend to me on several occasions when I needed one and I am sure many other people would say the same. The news of his death made me so sad. May he rest in peace. *Linda Booth*

My favourite memory of Mark happened in the late 1980's in Scarborough. This tale has been re-told on numerous occasions & always makes me smile.

The Young People's Department used to go on an annual day trip to Scarborough in summer, usually July. We would catch the train from Crossgates & on arrival make our way to the south side beach where Barbara & Jean, on their holidays, would meet us. We played games on the sand, had a picnic lunch, then went our separate ways, meeting at the station in the early evening to catch the train back.

As the years passed & the YPD got smaller, we decided one year to hire a minibus instead of taking the train. It was dreadful weather - cloudy, misty & raining. The first incident happened on the way, not far from Castle Howard. Linda Booth was driving when a cyclist rode into us from a side road. Thankfully no harm was done & he was dusted down & we carried on.

We arrived in Scarborough & Linda parked the minibus at the south side near the Spa, parallel to the sea wall. Mark was sitting nearest the door, so he slid it back, stepped out & was immediately engulfed by an enormous wave that had come over the top of the wall. We all fell about laughing & Mark to his credit took it in good stead. My diary entry for that day reads "Scarborough - poured it down all day, got soaked". Not as soaked as Mark though!

I had only been talking about this incident with my sister Andrea the day before we heard the sad news about Mark. *Alison Lambert*

You could say that Mark is the reason I am a member of Cross Gates Methodist Church. We were at school together and always got on well. I used to go to Manston St James C of E Church and the associated Youth Club. But Mark made his Youth Club sound so much better – he was there of course at the centre of a fun group of young people. So I tried out the Methodist Youth Club and Young People's Department and here I still am. Church and Youth Club were so important to us at that time – you would do anything rather than miss attending. I will always remember his crazy hair and kind, caring personality. *Tracy Dick*

Mark and Music is my memory. Mark playing the drums at church and for the show Oz is OK, an original rock musical loosely based on the Wizard of Oz - but modernised! We performed the show under the Leeds Art Theatre banner at the Civic Theatre, a couple of schools including Temple Moor and enjoyed three packed nights at the Bradford Alhambra in the 1970s. For us teenagers they were exciting times and we made the most of them! The offshoot was the Howard Ellis Band and again Mark was the drummer. The band had a great following and played gigs around Leeds - a favourite venue being Wigs Wine Bar in The Headrow, where we danced on the tables! I was also at school with Mark from Manston to Abbey Grange and although as adults we lost touch as our lives took different paths, he has always held a place in my heart, as a friend whose early years were intertwined through school, church, the show and the band - great fun, great memories and Mark was simply the best.

Spotlight on.....Hazel Watson

I was born on 14th June 1942 at St Luke's hospital in Bradford. We lived in Heath Terrace at the time. I have always been adventurous and even at 3 years old I would back out through the hedge to join the children at the Catholic school just down the road, at their playtime. So I was tied up with a long rope to keep me in the garden and to stop me escaping. I went to Lapage Street School at 3 years old. My teacher was Miss Marshall – all the teachers were spinsters at that time since men were away at war. I loved school and being with other children and making friends with girls and boys alike. I also went with my parents to Church at Eastbrook Hall in the centre of Bradford. We moved to Leeds in the centre of the city and my father did not want my mum to go out to work so that is why they bought a sweet and cigarette shop on Woodhouse Street. I used to walk down Meanwood Road to Clowes Methodist Church. I loved going to Church and when I was 15 I became leader of the Morning Sunday School. I loved this role and did it for 3 years until I went away to Dudley Teacher Training College in Worcestershire. I lived in a hostel there and had my own room in the building. We shared a small kitchen downstairs making snacks but the main kitchen downstairs served breakfast and dinner at set times. There was a duty room where two students were expected to be on duty until 10pm when all students had to be back in the hostel. I was not good at Maths so had to go for extra lessons with the Maths professor on Saturday mornings. I didn't like going but it really did help me. The professor was very patient. We also used to go to Revd Alan Dale's house on Sundays where we had discussions and could ask Revd Dale anything we wanted to know. At this time I made friends with three young students and I am still friends with them all after all this time. We sometimes go away on holiday together or meet up at a holiday destination and rent a cottage. In the past we have met up at Scarborough, Whitby, Blackpool, Fort William, Mallaig, Gairloch and Ullapool. It's getting a bit more difficult now we are older so we may choose a venue and take a coach trip there. I love Whitby and Fort William but getting there is not as easy as it was. Since I retired from teaching – and I used to teach Sunday School for a while – I don't do any formal teaching now, but I am always interested in young people. I sometimes talk to parents with children and try to encourage them to come to Church on Sundays. But now, so many parents do not want to be tied down on Sundays and Sunday School levels are very low. I like to talk to children but parents are very protective and are afraid that their children could be abducted or even abused if they talk to strangers. I still talk to people who sit on the Church bench and tell them about Jesus and God's love, in the hope that a little seed might grow.
