It has my old brownie badges, wedding photos and various certificates from my social work and counselling days. It has photos of the families I supported, and of course photos of my own babies. All precious memories which tell the story of my life and which have often been used to do just that as I have moved from place to place in my ministry in recent years.

I'm sure many of you will have something similar up in the loft, or perhaps have your memories on display all around you at home, souvenirs from holidays in exotic, or not so exotic places; photographs placed lovingly on shelves and tables to remind you of good times and significant events, friends and those you love. Sometimes it is good just to spend some time with our memories, to remember and reflect on all that has been good in our lives, and especially having lived through these past years of covid 19, to be thankful for the memories that have often kept us going.

Our Bible is full of memories too, written down with love and care to remind us of the story of God in the lives of so many through the age; Memories of encounters with God in the Old Testament, and with Jesus in the Gospels, memories of friends made as the new followers of 'The Way of Jesus' began to grow in number with the spread of the early Church. Memories of the difference encountering God had made to their

As we have gradually eased back into a life of connection again, as we remember— the first coffee with friends, the first barbeque with family, that first hug with grandchildren and those we missed so much, let's not forget to continue making fresh and lasting memories. Memories we can look back on in the future with great gladness and say with confidence 'I thank my God every time I remember you'.

A food pantry is different to a food bank, as members BUY a set number of items of their CHOICE for an affordable sum (such as 10 for £3.50). The Pantry is open to anybody, with food coming from organisations such as Fareshare and Rethink who distribute surplus food from supermarkets.

Volunteer roles will include ordering food, stocking shelves, serving and chatting to customers, signposting to other help, communication, book keeping and monitoring.

Summer Holiday Club for Local School Children

The popular Holiday club is running again over the summer for children aged 4-11 at St Richards, Seacroft, LS14 and St James, Manston, LS15. The club runs Monday to Thursday for 4 weeks with children taking part in a range of activities from baking and craft to outdoor games and singing. The goal is to ensure no child goes hungry in the holidays so every child gets a cooked lunch and families can also sign up for a food hamper if needed. A team of 20 people from across the churches and the wider community help make it happen. **Could you volunteer?** Roles include planning activities, set up /tidy up at the hall, preparing food hampers, serving lunch/refreshments, helping with a craft activity, leading a small group etc.

What Can I do to Save Energy?

As prices continue to increase it might be worth considering implementing a few simple cost saving measures:

- Taking 4 minute showers could save £70 a year
- Switching devices off standby could save £55 a year
- Running one load of washing less a week at 30 degrees could save £28 a year
- Air drying your clothes could save £60 a year
- Not over-filling the kettle could save £36 a year
- Turning off lights could save £20 a year
- Running one less dishwasher load per week could save £14 a year

It is also worth taking regular meter readings to make sure your bill is accurate.

Plus using less electricity is good for the planet as well as your finances!

Spotlight on..... Dorothy Weston

I think my two sisters, brother and I were lucky growing up on a farm with lots of space to roam around in, almost idyllic. Dad was a tenant farmer on the Swillington House Estate owned by Sir William Lowther. We went to the village Church and primary school, walking four miles a day – two there, lunch and then two back. We all had to earn our bikes by feeding hens, helping at haymaking time, harvest and later in the year potato picking. Pre machines we also helped milk the cows.

School summer holidays were the best time. Friends came down from the village and we played hide and seek, sardines, tennis and endless cricket - only going in at mealtimes and bedtime.

When I was nineteen I was sent to London by the bank I worked for because they were short staffed. A year or two later I returned home and went to live in Wighill, north of Tadcaster as Dad was retiring there. Then I was transferred to York which meant I had to travel to work via Lambretta as the buses were few and far between. This was lovely in the summer months but not so good in the winter!

At that time we all attended the village chapel which my uncle helped run as he was a Methodist local preacher. I was roped in to play the harmonium for services. Playing this instrument is like an all body workout! If you didn't keep pedalling and moving the swells out sideways no sound came forth. I soon learnt I had to keep going!

History Corner

1907 - 1908

The Church was enlarged by the addition of transept, chancel, lecture hall, vestries etc with an institute beneath. Within the enlarged Church the pulpit was moved from the centre to the side and the choir stalls and organ were also repositioned. Total cost of the extension was £3,260: seating accommodation was now 652 – a magnificent and far-sighted scheme at a time when the membership was still only 64!

1909 - 1913

Years of change: Bleriot made the first aeroplane flight across the English Channel and the following year (May 1910) King Edward VII died. In Cross Gates the Recreation Hall was opened and foundation stones laid for two new Churches – Manston new Church, which opened in 1913, and the Baptist Church at Whitkirk. Roads were becoming busier and in 1911 the Whinmoor/Coal Road Toll Bar was freed. The village was rapidly becoming a thriving residential area with houses built in The Drive and Manton Gardens and the first two shops in Church Lane opened. In November 1912 Cross Gates became part of Leeds and by the end of 1913 a manse on Austhorpe Road had been bought by the Trustees.

1914 - 1918

The work of the Church went on during the war years. In August 1915 the war was brought closer to the people of Cross Gates when Barnbow Shell Filling Factory was opened on the site of the Golf Course, employing about 16,000 workers. It was a dangerous place to work – tragedy struck on 5th December 1916 when there was an explosion in which 35 women were killed and many more injured. There were to be two more explosions, one in 1917 when two women were killed and 1918 when three men were killed.

The problem of food shortages also had to be faced. At the Leaders' meeting in 1917 it was decided that 'in view of the unprecedented conditions now prevailing, no tea be provided at the Quarterly meeting later in June.' In 1917 the produce of the Harvest Festival was disposed of for the benefit of the wounded soldiers at Killingbeck Hospital. In

response to the King's appeal, the 6th January 1918 was observed as a day of intercession.
