I'm writing this the day after the last Circuit Meeting I will be part of in Leeds North and East. I'm well into that season of 'lasts'. It's not a period I enjoy, and part of me just wants to be the other side of it all, settled into the house in Leicester with Paula and knowing the names of the people I'll be working with there. In the meantime, there is a lot of sorting out to be done, and getting rid of stuff. We have to fit two manses worth of furniture, two ministers' worth of books, and all the other paraphernalia we have acquired over 30 years (Paula) and 25 years (me) of ministry into one manse. But alongside the physical sorting out is the sorting through of memories and reflecting on the last five years. I can confidently say they have not been what I expected, even though I'm not quite sure what I was expecting. A pandemic was definitely not on my radar. In some ways my memory of this circuit will be coloured by the lockdowns and all the new things we learnt through that. Whatever the next few months and years bring, I pray that you will continue journeying with God. So I leave you with a poem I wrote some time ago.

#### Leeds South & East Foodbank helping local people in crisis

In May we delivered to the Leeds South and East Food Bank centre 11 baskets of food and toiletries weighing 135Kg.

We have all probably noticed that food prices seem to be continually rising. This makes it difficult for some families to afford even basic items, forcing them to use food banks. The South and East Leeds (Trussell Trust) Food Bank supplies 9 local distribution points.

As well as gifts of food, several Church Members, contribute money with which we buy items on their behalf, after first checking what the Banks require. All money, plus how it is spent, is recorded. Thus, the price of basic items at today's price can be compared with earlier costs. Listed below are basic items bought which can be compared with the price (in brackets) paid 18 months ago:-

Coffee (£1.45) £1.85. Corned Beef (1.19) £2.05. Carton Orange (£0.55) £0.65. Tin of Potatoes (£0.33) £0.39. Custard tin (0.39) £0.70. Porridge (£0.70) £0.84. Penne Pasta (£0.32) £0.41. Chopped Tomatoes (£0.28) £0.35. All prices are from two main Supermarkets.

#### Request for Help

There are a few rotas we would like to get set up in order to make Church run more smoothly and be more welcoming to all. Can you help?

**2** Door steward and 1 welcomer: Cynthia is happy to continue as the welcomer in the outside doorway. Welcoming would involve welcoming everyone as they come in, giving out notice sheets etc if required. Door Steward: explain to new people that the service will be on the screen and ask them if they will be able to see it. If not, advise them which book(s) they need to take in with them. To be a 'host'. Open up at 10am, set up kitchen for coffee then serve refreshments throughout the session. This could be 11 – 1pm or 1 pm to 3pm. Helping with the clearing up afterwards.

### <u>A 'smelly' memory from Pauline Brown</u>

I was christened in November 1947 in Devonport, Plymouth, at St. Aubyns C.O.E. Church. The area was still quite a bombsite and remember as a tot the piles of bricks etc around. At about three years old I was allowed to go to the friend's or relative house under the watchful eye of another aunt but unfortunately somehow managed to fall in a whatever you like to call it, a disgusting pile of foul stuff from a damaged sewer! To this day I can remember being carried at arm's length between my mum and her sister, auntie Frances, through to the back yard and straight into the tin bath! Whether this has had any bearing on the fact I have a quite acute smell sense! Not long after my mum and dad got the keys to a brand new council house on an estate called Ernesettle. We were one of the first to move in, a great difference to the heavily bombed Devonport. It was lovely.

Hope this gives a bit of light relief and not too smelly a memory!

Having shared details of Philip Smith's family in the previous newsletters, here is his own story – **Christine Holdstock**.

#### Memoirs of Philip Michael Smith

I was born on the 14<sup>th</sup> October 1942 at 35 Easterly Road - this former house was used as a maternity home during the 2<sup>nd</sup> World War. My parents were Harry Bernard Smith and Mary Smith (formerly Flowith). My grandfather Arthur Flowith moved to 18 Austhorpe Road, Cross Gates in 1913, when he married Mary Elizabeth Dowie. This rented property was just across the road from the Methodist Church and he lived there for 23 years, had six children between 1914 & 1929, before moving to his own property, 66 Cross Gates Lane in 1934. My grandmother Mary Elizabeth Dowie was a Fever Nurse at the Tropical Disease Hospital at Seacroft in 1911. She was a Wesleyan Methodist and it is likely she met her husband through this mutual connection.

My family were immersed in Cross Gates Methodist Church as both grandfathers were appointed Trustees in May 1936. My father Harry B Smith was Scout Master and my mother Mary Flowith was Cub Master. My grandmother Mary Elizabeth Flowith was a leading light in their 'Women's Bright Hour' and the church has two plaques recording three family members (my father and two uncles) who lost their lives between 1934 and 1944. Both grandfathers were born in 1880, and were fortunate to miss the first world war and were special police constables in the second.



I lived with my mother and my Flowith grandparents at 66 Crossgates Lane. This photograph was taken in the front garden with me in my Oakwood Preparatory School Uniform alongside Arthur Flowith. He had a strong personality and made all the decisions regarding the everyday routine under his roof. His Wesleyan Methodist upbringing decreed that Sundays were special and to be observed by attendance at Church and the only book to be read was the bible. At this age I had no concept that this restriction was severe and just complied. Sundays for me were determined by morning attendance at Sunday School in the annexe and when that finished, I went round to the front of the Church and joined Arthur Flowith for the main service in the family pew by the main door. We walked home for lunch and then I returned for afternoon Sunday school and sometimes the evening service. The Sunday School gave out annual book prizes for full attendances and I achieved a full set, though their choice of reading material was limited to religious offerings such as "The Pilgrim's Progress" which I received in 1952. I also have the last book I received in 1954 which was "The Methodist Hymn Book" and my mother received her copy in 1934. My grandfather John Smith received a copy of "Tennyson's Poetical Works" for "regular attendance". All these books are in my Family Tree archive. I also remember performing as a bear in a pantomime in the church annex.

Scouting played a big part in my father's life and his involvement is mentioned in several letters from the late 1930's. The 14<sup>th</sup> North East Leeds (Cross Gates) Scout Group was formed in 1927 followed by the cub section in 1928. The chief instigator was John T Thompson (JT) who lived in the area between 1925 and 1962 and served as Group Scout Leader for most of that time. He was presented with the highest possible Scout Leaders award of a Silver Wolf by Lord Rowallan in 1959 having completed 40 years of service.

My father would have been just the right age to have been a scout when they were first established in Cross Gates although he was already a member of another troop and transferred to the 14<sup>th</sup> when his parents relocated. There are many references to the influence that JT (that was the common abbreviation of his name that was still in use when I knew him) had over the young members of the church.

My father passed through the various scout stages until becoming an assistant scout master in 1934 and became the warranted scout master in June 1939. It is interesting to note that my mother became a warranted cubmaster in May 1937 so she would have known her future husband for at least 5 years before they married in Cross Gates Church.

I was a member of the cubs and then the Scouts. I remember meeting JT at his house on Hollyshaw Lane - his house walls were covered in South African memorabilia, spears, clubs and shields. I moved from Cross Gates when I was 15 but I remained in Scouting most of my life.
