Forgive us for not using our digital tools responsibly and for not valuing face-to-face relationships as we should.

#### We say together the Lord's Prayer

#### All Age Talk

So, our talk today tells us of a story from the Bible, Jesus tells us about a great banquet. A banquet is like a fancy feast with delicious food, music, and lots of fun. It's a special celebration!

In this story, there's a king who decides to throw a big banquet for his son's wedding. He sends out invitations to many people to come and join in the celebration. Can you imagine getting an invitation to such an amazing party? Imagine King's Coronation levels.

But here's the surprising part. When the invitations go out, some of the guests start making excuses. One says, "I'm too busy with my work," and another says, "I just bought a new cow, and I need to take care of it." Can you believe that? They were too busy or had other things they thought were more important.

So, the king tells his servants to go out into the streets and invite anyone they can find, good people and not-so-good people, to come to the feast. And guess what? People from all over come to the banquet, and the celebration is in full swing.

But here's a twist in the story. The king comes in to meet the guests, and he sees one person who isn't wearing the special wedding clothes provided by the king. When the king asks why, the guest doesn't have an answer.

So, what does this story mean? It teaches us something essential. The king in the story represents God, and the banquet is like heaven—a joyful place where God wants to be with us forever. The first guests who made excuses are like people who

sometimes ignore God's love and kindness because they're too busy or have other priorities.

But God's love is so great that He invites everyone, no matter who they are, to be with the parental God. We can't earn our way to heaven; it's a gift from God. But once we accept that gift, we need to live in a way that shows we appreciate it.<sup>3</sup>

#### Reflections on the readings

I've just got back from a family holiday. Usually we fly out early morning arriving in our resort by lunch time, enjoy a leisurely afternoon by the pool then shower and get changed and ready to enjoy the evening's entertainment (although our two are less interested in the mini disco now!) This year we just could not get flights, prices and the all important hotel with water slides to match up with our preferred patten. So, we ended up flying late in the afternoon.

This was not a good decision!

It turns out that our local airport is a lot busier in the afternoon than it is early in the morning, so seating is at a real premium with lots of people choosing to stand at the bar or sit wherever they can on the floor. Wherever you end up, you need to be close enough to peer intently at the screen, waiting for that joyous moment when your gate is announced.

The flight itself is actually, usually, quite restful. So long as you can put up with the cramped space and a few hours of discomfort, but at least you have a seat.

It was when we landed that the fun and games began again. Another airport with too many people and not enough seats as we begin the frantic battle to retrieve our cases from the least fun carousel in the world. From there, a long walk in the evening humidity, dragging our suitcases and being hassled at every turn by drivers looking for work.

Finally we made it, through the touts, through the heat, to the coach that would take us the 20min transfer to our hotel. We packed our cases into the luggage hold and took our seats and waited. Then, after 10 minutes, and a number of other travellers boarded the coach, we waited some more. Once it seemed that all of the others

journeying with us had stashed their cases and boarded the coach, finally, we were ready... to wait some more!

Apparently one of the families who was supposed to be joining the coach had decided they didn't want to journey with us and it seemed they were getting a private transfer instead. It would have been good if they had told our coach driver so we didn't have to wait!

How frustrating that somebody had decided not to show up for something that had been prepared and was waiting for them. Judging by the coach drivers loud conversations with the holiday company rep, I don't think he was very pleased either. Although he didn't go quite as far in response as the King in Matthew 22.

Our gospel reading this morning tells the story not of a holiday, but of a wedding feast. We hear about its preparations including the invitations that are made. Yet, when all is made ready, those who have been invited chose not to attend, offering a number of different excuses or, in one particularly brutal case, killing the messengers. The King in Jesus's story, retold by Matthew, responds to this slight by sending out his servants again, this time inviting anyone they find to come and share at the feast. After, that is, he orders the murder and destruction of the cities that had visited violence on his messengers!

It seemed a shame then that we couldn't do the same on that coach. Not the murder and destruction bit! I mean go out and search for someone who hadn't booked a place on the transfer, saving them from the scrums at the taxi lines!

Jesus's story though, is obviously about far more than just a wedding and its guests. It's a parable that explains to us the concept of universalism. Jesus is explaining to those listening that the Kingdom of God is open to everyone, not just a select group.

The first group of invited guests are supposed to represent the Jewish people, those who thought of themselves as God's people. The way the parable unfolds would have made it clear to those listening that simply being invited is not enough. Their attendance at the feast required them to respond and actually turn up!

It may be that the people in the story who reacted violently to the invitation are supposed to be a foreshadowing of the way the prophets, and even Jesus himself, would be met by violence.

Those in the story who do chose to attend the feast are supposed to represent the Gentiles. The Gentiles were those who weren't Jewish and who didn't follow God so to suggest they would be gladly invited to the feast, and infer that invitation to the Kingdom of God, was a radical readjustment of Jewish theology.

And wouldn't it be lovely if we could just leave things there?

However, the parable doesn't end on that happy note of all being invited. Once everyone is happily tucking into the fattened cattle the King notices that one of the guests isn't dressed appropriately and deals with him by tying him up and chucking him out the door. Now, as I'm still considered fairly young in most of my churches and have a rocker/biker kind of aesthetic I tend to think most people in our churches are inappropriately dressed, and I'm absolutely sure the feeling is mutual! It's a good job then that we're dealing with a parable here and that it's meaning has absolutely nothing to do with the way that we dress but is all to do with how prepared and committed we are. The man who is ejected wasn't prepared to commit himself fully to the feast.

While this parable clearly says that everyone can come to God's Kingdom, Jesus is expecting us to respond with a commitment.

#### Some questions to consider:

- Do we sometimes think Jesus is only for those of us already in our churches?
- Can you think of any examples where we might exclude people from worship?
- How can we work harder as a church to make sure everyone knows God is for them?
- How can we re-affirm our commitment to Jesus in the coming days and weeks?<sup>4</sup>
