Live, Laugh, Love

It seems to me a thing synonymous with the décor of the last decade or so, the unending variety of signs which say 'Live, Laugh, Love', that you can purchase for your own home, or see in cafes and garden centres galore. For some of us, it's a lovely snappy summary of an encouragement to live life well, whereas I'm sure for others it hits a somewhat trite note.

Whether or not you're ready to pop up a 'Live, Laugh, Love' sign on your wall, I want to suggest it's a really good summary of what Easter celebrations are all about.

Firstly, 'Live'. Jesus is alive! He is risen! Death is dead, and we are assured that there is life beyond this earthly one. More than that, since we can know that Jesus died to wipe away our sins, we can also live more fully here on earth. We can live liberated from the pull of guilt and sinfulness, knowing we are accepted, forgiven, redeemed through Jesus' amazing sacrifice for us.

Secondly, 'Laugh'. So many seasons and traditions in the church seem like sombre affairs. But did you know there's an early Christian tradition called *'risus paschalis'* or 'Easter Laughter'? It's a wonderful tradition and one I'm very keen to re-engage with. It stems from the idea that perhaps God laughed at the face of the devil when Jesus was raised back to life-like the ultimate practical joke, the devil's grip on sin and death and fallible mortals was broken, shown to be folly, by God's amazing work of resurrection in Jesus. In order to carry on the laughter, priests who enjoyed this tradition would make sure their congregations were roaring with laughter on Easter Sunday, often perhaps being a little on the cheeky side of things, and some congregations held the tradition that the

preacher couldn't finish until the church were all rolling in the aisles with their sides splitting!

We laugh because the gift of Jesus being raised back to life is outrageous, incredible, and utter joy - we laugh because the folly of the old way of things, that sin and death are unconquerable, is done, and God is good!

Thirdly, 'Love'. From the beginning of time, and even before, the story of God's relationship with humanity and all creation is one of love. A deep, inconceivable love, that means that God would send his own child to be one of us, and to die for us, as one of us.

In this love, we all are held, made fully alive, and known better than we could ever know ourselves. This love is also what we are called to. So as we celebrate this Easter time, perhaps we will remember that Easter is not just for the Church. It's the climax of the greatest, truest love story there has ever been, and we are called to share and show this love in all the world, in all kinds of ways.

I pray you have a wonderful Easter, and that you can remember how precious you are to God who sent Jesus so you may fully live, raised him so we might laugh at the old order of things, and shows us love in greater abundance than we can ever understand, and asks us to show that love to others.

He is Risen! Happy Easter!

Statement on Antisemitism and Islamophobia

A statement from the President and Vice President of the Methodist Conference, the Revd Gill Newton and Deacon Kerry Scarlett

We are deeply saddened and concerned about the increase in antisemitism and Islamophobia in the United Kingdom. Such incidents, attacks and attitudes are fundamentally opposed to Jesus' command to love our neighbour. The tangible fear and tension for British Jewish and Muslim communities as a result of these incidents have no place in our society and are a real threat to community cohesion.

The 2023 Methodist Conference reiterated our commitment to oppose antisemitism and to stand by all who are discriminated against or persecuted on the grounds of their religion or ethnicity. We recognise that as a Church we need to be vigilant about our own language, voice and actions, and continue to repent and learn from past wrongs. We are committed to being an inclusive Church that challenges antisemitism, Islamophobia and all forms of discrimination.

We call on our elected leaders to lead by example and not only call out any discrimination on ethnic or religious grounds but to ensure that in their language they do not incite antisemitism and Islamophobia. We also believe that we are called as Christians to challenge all policies and practices which perpetuate injustice, oppression, violence and suffering. This includes instances where states, political parties, politicians or groups try to silence legitimate criticism of policies and actions by claiming they are antisemitic or Islamophobic.

As a justice-seeking Church we believe in building communities of inclusion and challenging discriminatory speech and behaviour, recognising that we are all created in God's image and have value and worth. We continue this work of seeking justice, peace and flourishing through our interfaith relationships and with all who share a vision of a society where no-one is discriminated against and all are free to fulfil their God-given potential.

<u>The History of Cross Gates Libraries - Part Two</u> <u>By East Leeds History & Archaeology Society</u>

The Percival Leigh Library, designed by local architect Charles Castelow and built by RM Thompson Ltd of Leeds, was opened on the 14^{th} December 1939. The opening ceremony was performed by Lord Harewood. The post of City Librarian was then held by R.J. Gordon. The library occupies a site of some 1330 square yards and is situated opposite the main shopping centre, at the top of Farm Road. It was built on the site of an old farm owned by John Wilson of Seacroft. The total building costs came to £18,600 and the internal fittings added another £2,500. The initial stock of books cost £3,500.

Being the largest branch library in the city, and possibly the UK, it was outstanding in design and structure, and as such attracted many visitors. It had a main lending room, a reading room, a study room and a children's library. It also contained a staff rest room and dining room, a work room and store room. The children's library was designed to be both a lending area and reading room. It had a central seating area arranged around an electric fire and was a bright and airey space to encourage the local children to make full use of all the facilities the library had to offer. Horsforth artist Edward da Lister painted a mural around the walls which showed children's heroes, and inhabitants of different countries. The cost of the mural was £75.00.

The library was named after Percival Leigh, a former Lord Mayor of Leeds and Chairman of the Libraries and Arts Committee. He and his wife were active in the cultural life of the city and his wife is remembered for donating her collection of cookery books to the library at Leeds University. Since the library was built at the beginning of World War Two, things were fairly quiet until the late 40's early 50's. However, when the country started to get back on its feet and rebuild, it became known as one of the finest examples of its kind and librarians and local authority staff came from all over the world to view it. A look at just one page of the Visitors Book from the 1950's shows entries from Switzerland, the USA, Greece, Egypt, India and many other counties, as well as many places in the British Isles. It was well used during the post war years and library records show that between 1940 and 1951 almost five million books were lent out.
