Our sisters in The Cook Islands welcome us and lead us for the Day of Prayer 2025. This group of 15 islands in the South Pacific Ocean has a rich and colourful Māori heritage and a deep connection to nature. Join with us as we pray together and reflect on the theme 'I made you wonderful'. World Day of Prayer is an international, ecumenical organisation which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world: their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is vast, the service begins with the writing country and theme being chosen a number of years earlier. Once written it goes to the International Committee in New York for translation and dissemination to the National Committee in each participating country. The service is then discussed and edited before being presented nationally, regionally and then locally for branches to make their plans. Finally, at a church near you, on Friday 7 March 2025, people will gather to celebrate the service prepared by the women of The Cook Islands. The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 120 countries. It begins in Samoa and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world — through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 38 hours later.

A big **Thank You** to everyone who gave so generously to St Gemma's Hospice & Action for Children at Christmas. £179.28, including £12.50 Gift Aid, was donated at the Carol Service for St Gemma's. £130.00 was raised in lieu of Christmas cards, £45.71 from singing carols on the Church steps and £282.55 donated at the Christmas services for Action for Children. With an additional £22.50 Gift Aid a total of £480.76 was raised.

While Rev Becki is on sabbatical we will look back at the pieces Ministers wrote in the 60s, 70s and 80s for the newsletters of the time. We will also include some of the other newsletter content from the same edition. How much has changed and how much remains the same?

My dear friends

Until there's more wealth to share, the only way for too-low-paid workers to get a fair deal is for others to be prepared to take less. Even those of us who are bewildered by economics can see that. Similarly, the only way for the millions who are poor to have a fair share is for rich nations to grab a little less of the world's cake.

Even at the beginning of Lent that kind of self-denial is a tall order or a forlorn hope.

It is significant as well as sad that the main form of self-denial practiced in the affluent West is to try to lose some excess weight by denying ourselves calories for the sake of our own health. Dieting is fine and personal health is part of our stewardship but there's more to self-denial than that. In Lenten terms it is meant to be a deliberate bridling of selfishness and self-concern for the sake of other people. Somehow the West and the nation and for that matter the church need to be persuaded about that.

All of this concerns stewardship. For a number of reasons, we have postponed our planned review until the Autumn but there are some immediate ways for each of us to make an individual review. This newsletter carries details of several openings needing time or talents or money. And clearly any of us whose income has improved over the last eighteen months will want to make the necessary adjustments in our weekly giving.

If you are to do that sort of reassessment for your own sake or for the sake of church, nation or world you will need some time to be quiet to think it through. That essentially is what 'imitation of Christ' in Lent is all about. The climax of a most enjoyable youth weekend I have just shared at Scarborough was in a period of silence. But we need to be quiet and still more than once a year. We all need a regular, even daily, place of quiet to retire to......an inner room within ourselves...for renewing, refreshing, recovering perspective, listening.... to open the heart's door a little more to the healing mainstream of eternal Love.

The March 1979 newsletter also included a report of the Scarborough weekend:

We arrived in Scarborough on Saturday February 24th for our annual conference in which 59 of us joined. The main theme this year was future, past and present and how they affect our understanding of Holy Communion. Thoughts were first directed towards the future, and we considered how technological innovations would affect our lifestyles and religion and discussed the long term hopes of the church for unity within itself and the world. Through the use of exciting experimental games, we explored our reliance on the five senses; then a short summary of Christ's life showed how he had given us in Holy Communion something which we could relate to with all our senses.

On Sunday the Communion service dominated our thoughts. We began in the morning with a few guidelines from Mr Taylor by way of preparation. After a short breather the morning culminated in the celebration of Holy Communion which was followed by a period of silence. This silence provided time for private meditation and was found to be helpful and stimulating by the majority. On Sunday afternoon a desire was expressed to maintain in our daily lives and in our meetings with others the closeness to God we had experienced during our stay in Scarborough. The weekend was rounded off with an open forum for questions and finally prayers. Amidst all the discussions and hard work there was a fair amount of frivolity, and a good time was had by all. We wish to express our thanks to the leaders and all others concerned.

The 1979 newsletter also included a reflection on 'lifestyle'

As a theme for Lent the Division of Social Responsibility asks Methodists to look at lifestyles. We are all aware of the excessive constrasts between the affluent, greedy lifestyles of the advanced countries and the poor, meagre economies of most Third World Countries. It is clearly unjust and Christians often say so whilst making little or no effort to change the way things are. Does a Christian lifestyle imply changes in the way we order our lives, use our time and resources, spend our money? Is it about stewardship writ large in the whole of living, rather than a narrower view that tends to limit it to our church-based activities?

Warm Spaces

Over 14.4 million people live in poverty in the UK and 7% of people experience chronic loneliness.

It was estimated that at least 13 per cent of people living in England experienced fuel poverty last year, while many more felt that they could only justify putting on their heating during the most severe spells of weather.

When we joined our Church around 42 years ago the Church was looking at a Stewardship campaign – exploring how we could better use our time and money – and as Church Treasurer Keith headed this project - with renewal campaigns every 4 years or so. Indeed, he continued not only as our Church Treasurer; guiding our finances but also as Circuit Financial Steward – both jobs he held to way past normal retirement age. Keith and his wife Jean were early members of the Rambling Club, with a love of walking. I remember with joy the friendship generated with this group as we walked through sunshine, rain and snow. Keith was responsible for the Winter Walk programme, often with walks around 20 miles long. Keith and Jean often planned walking weekends and then longer weeks away for the Club, which were enjoyed by all members. The West Highland Way was walked by Jean and Keith covering 96 miles from Glasgow to Fort William and Cynthia and I walked the Clevland Way (109 miles) with them from Helmsley, and the Dales Way from Ilkley to Windermere, 81 miles.

The comradeship of the Men's Fellowship Group was enjoyed and both Keith and Jean were long time members of Wednesday at 8. Keith had a deep, strong, singing voice and together with Peter Motley, Alan Tate and Raymond Winders, joined Leeds Male voice choir. Both rehearsals and concerts were really enjoyed by Keith and membership continued until the Choir was disbanded. We were able to share another important thing in Keith's life. Keith had been taken to Headingly to see Leeds Rhinos at an early age and followed the team through good times and bad, firstly with Don Oates and then it was a privilege for Cynthia and I to accompany him.

He was so proud of his family - daughters, grandchildren and greatgranddaughter. Keith had a sound alert mind even when his body failed, and we never once heard him complain.
