All Age Talk

Have you ever tried to carry something that was just too big or too heavy to carry all at once? Maybe a huge stack of books, or too many grocery bags?

(Ask the congregation for a few responses if appropriate.)

Sometimes you have to take things one step at a time. You carry one or two bags, then come back for more. You learn a little at a time; you are stronger and wiser before you know it.

In today's Bible reading, Jesus is speaking to his friends. He says something exciting: "I have so much more to tell you, but you cannot bear it all right now. But do not worry, because the Spirit of Truth will come to help you."

Jesus says learning about God is a bit like carrying those heavy bags. We cannot understand everything all at once. But we are not left alone. God sends the Spirit to guide us step by step.

The Spirit of Truth is another name for the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit helps us know what is right, feel God's love, and nudges us to act kindly, reasonably, and courageously. The Holy Spirit speaks of the same love that comes from the parental God.

So, when we listen carefully, pray, or feel that little tug on our hearts to help or forgive someone, that might well be the Holy Spirit at work.

Today, we remember that Jesus promised that we would never be without help. Even when life feels confusing or we are unsure what to do, the Holy Spirit guides us.

It is a bit like being on a path at night. Imagine you are walking and you have a small torch. You cannot see everything immediately, but the light shows you enough to take the next step. Then the next. And then the next. The Holy Spirit is like that torch always shining enough light for us to keep walking forward with trust.

So here is a challenge for us this week:

- When making a choice, big or small, why not stop for a moment and say, "Holy Spirit, guide me".
- When you feel unsure, remember you are not alone. The Spirit is speaking and guiding you, just like Jesus promised.

Let us trust that God's Spirit will always lead us in love, in truth, and in hope.

Reflections on the readings

There is a dance at the centre of God.

The dance entwines Creator, Son and Spirit in a spiral of interlocking understanding. The dance of God, within God's very self, the perplexing nature of Jesus, the invisible and unpredictable work of the Spirit and the initiating and sustaining Creator of all things visible and invisible, each coming into focus and disappearing in a blur as we wrestle with Scripture, experience and reason in our human search for meaning. Today is Trinity Sunday and it's absolutely fine to be baffled!

Dancing is not everybody's thing. To attend church in Africa can be excruciatingly embarrassing for a White Westerner with no sense of rhythm, the couples dancing tango in the streets of Buenos Aires may have impressive and sultry frissance which is impossible to replicate by a person with two left feet. But maybe the Scottish school concert that ends with a Ceidlh best embodies the dance of the Trinity that is in the heart of God?

Danger strikes at this point because it would be all too glib to liken the 'caller' to the creator, the participants to the incarnate one and the music to the spirit – but this would be to miss the point. The point is that this dance, where lads dance with lads and grannies with granddaughters and where everyone gets it wrong and things end up in hilarious chaos, is about the relationship between the dancers, the music and the call. It is the relationship that matters.

And the doctrine of the Trinity is just one way of describing this relationship. There are times when God as Creator is central to our faith, but also times when it is hard to believe in the on-going work of Creation when so much around us is seemingly overwhelmed by destruction. There are times when the way of Jesus fills our hearts with joy and excitement, but also times when this troubling Aramean seems to talk in undecipherable riddles. There are times when God's Spirit excites and inspires us but also times when we feel dry and exhausted. Aspects of God come into focus or blur into the background. And this is not cause for despair but rather how God is within God's self, in Jim Cotter's words, within the dance of life giver, pain bearer, love maker who dwells among us and beyond us both graciously and hopefully.

In today's reading from Romans, we can hear the writer wrestling with what it means to be a follower of Jesus when things are really hard going. And although we must be wary of any notion that suffering should be sought out on purpose, he goes on to point out that Jesus didn't wait for all to be well before loving the world, for it was the broken, fragile messed up world that he came to love. The spirit of grace and truth is still gifted to us. Hope does not disappoint us.

We are not observers of this dance, we are not the passive audience phoning in our scores remotely assessing the performance. On the contrary, we are invited into the dance, even with our lack of rhythm and our two left feet, we are beckoned into this relationship with the Triune God, the Creator, Spirit and Beloved Child.

To participate in this dance is to enter into a relationship with others that see the world as divine and the work of the spirit active amongst and within the beauty and struggles of our lives. It is a call to find grace and hope in unlikely places and to go on believing within chaos and change. To enter into God's dance is to live in hope, and hope does not disappoint us because hope, through creativity, incarnation and the energy of the Spirit, is at the heart of God's relationship with the world.

Some questions for discussion in small groups, or as a whole congregation:

Which part of the Trinity do you relate to most and why?

How can you see 'God's dance' in your neighbourhood?

Where is hope to be found and how is Christian hope different?

When the conversation has run its course, bring people back together with this short prayer:

Triune God, we pray to you today, asking for your wisdom, your grace and your energy to bring hope into the world around us, to join in with your dance, to play our part in the emergence of your Kingdom, here on earth.
