#### We say together the Lord's Prayer

#### All Age Talk

Lets start with a famous quote from this week's gospel reading: "for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

What do you class as your treasures in life? You may think of your memories, time spent with family or friends, you might think about a gift you received for your birthday/Christmas that you cherish, maybe it's something that you worked hard to pay for. When you treasure something you often want to protect it, hold it close to you, maybe you want to hide it away so no one steals it or damages it.

When we think of treasure we often think of Pirates hiding boxes of treasure so that it can't be stolen, and then drawing a map so they can find it again.

God tells us that our heart will always be where our treasure is, the place where we focus our energy and our spirit. So then he warns us, that our treasures on Earth will not make the journey to heaven with us, therefore we should be focussed on treasures of the spirit, gifts that God has given us. God has given us gifts in abundance, we can start with the gift of life, and the gift of creation. We could look at the fruit of the Spirit and focus on the treasures of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

We could spend time recognising in ourselves the individual gifts that God has given us that make us who we are. Whether it be a gift for preaching the word, for pastoral care of others, for prayer, for witness, for service.

What can we see is the benefit of these treasures rather than earthly treasures?

The treasures mentioned all both glorify God, but they also benefit other people.

Jesus tells us that "where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" where do you want your heart to be? Wrapped up in earthly possessions that will one day be defunct, or wrapped up in glorifying God, helping others, wrapped in joy, love and peace?<sup>3</sup>

#### Reflections on the readings

Luke begins this passage with the phrase 'Don't be afraid' - words we hear again and again throughout the gospels.

Maybe Jesus knows his followers too well, and understands that actually in life there is much to be anxious about. Indeed, this section follows Jesus's advice not to worry about food or clothing but to strive for God's Kingdom above all. Often we can dismiss the real concerns of others too quickly, telling them not to worry, or that things will be alright. Sometimes it is easier to assure others than to convince ourselves. But here Jesus is telling his disciples not to worry because God has their best interests at heart. Jesus is asking his disciples to respond to God's generous love, and to be ready to encounter God at any moment. How are they going to do that if they are pre-occupied or distracted, worn down by worry, anxious about the future?

With these words, Luke seeks to tell his readers that they should be ready to be surprised by the generosity of God, the God who wants to lavish them with the gifts of the Kingdom. In order to receive these gifts, Jesus is asking his followers to discern what is important and to prioritise it without getting distracted.

So, let's look at what our priorities might be here and now? They will be different for each one of us, depending on our circumstances and our context, but let's also with humility recognise our own limitations. God is beyond our anxious human declarations of 'that's not possible' or 'how could we possibly make a difference' or even 'that's someone else's responsibility' – all thoughts or words we might utter in the face of challenge and change. However, God doesn't ask us to do anything in our own strength or relying on our own good ideas – God partners with God's people as they seek in prayer and the examination of scripture to partner with God, to seek God's heart for us and for all people and to respond.

God's desire is for us to receive God's gift of the Kingdom, and Kingdom values – freedom for those held back by injustice and inequality, where those ignored are listened to, where those who are troubled experience deep peace, where those who are grieving or in pain find solace and comfort. So if this is what God is ready to gift God's people, then what is it that God requires of us?

Micah 6 instructs us to do justice, love, kindness and walk humbly with God. Mark 12 asks us to love the Lord our God with all our heart, mind, soul and strength and to love our neighbour as we love ourselves. In both of the passages above we can see what it is we need to do is simply set out. As we seek to love God and love others we need to incorporate justice and mercy into our living and serving. In doing this we demonstrate our desire for all people to fulfil their potential.

In our praying and in our action we are required to think beyond ourselves and notice where in the wider world, as well as our immediate neighbours, others might flourish and recognise their worth, as children of the God who loves them. 'It is our father's good pleasure for you to receive the Kingdom' - life in all its fullness, gift and grace. I was recently reading an article that Roger Walton wrote in 2018, addressing some words of John Wesley 'Go not to those who want you, but those who want you most.' (Go to those who want you most – Theology Everywhere). Like Walton I had also wrongly imagined that Wesley had used the word need instead of want, and that in my life and ministry tried to allocate time based on need. I feel that this might be a human response but it does require a level of discernment and wide knowledge to be able to assess both the needs of others and the capacity to know if and how we should respond. Sometimes there are others who are better placed and better resourced to be able to make a difference and this is why churches which seek to build relationships and seek partnerships in local communities can

find this hugely beneficial and find that the Kingdom values that we long to see can be seen when we let go of our desire to control and own projects or pieces of work. The Methodist Church are beginning to embed 'Faith Based Community Organising' as a way of enabling us to respond well to issues in our neighbourhoods – you can find more by searching the Methodist Church's website for Faith-Rooted Community Organising – where there are also opportunities for training and development which are open to all.

So as we go into a new week sustained by worshipping our generous God together:

- What are the distractions, concerns or worries we are carrying where we would like to hear God speak 'Do not be afraid'?
- What might it mean to readjust our understanding that 'being ready for God' might not be about fear or judgement but being ready to be received by a God who delights to feed and serve us?
- What could partnership working (on a small or large scale) look like for your church and your community, that blessed by co-working with God we might see seeds, shoots and the fruits of the Kingdom here on earth?
