We all have bad days, or bad things that happen. Sometimes we say that the bad things make the good things feel better, we might say this to comfort ourselves. People also might say things like 'this is only for a season' or 'this too shall pass.' What do you think they mean by that?

[Give people time to think about this, perhaps sharing in small groups].

Well, what a Christian might mean if they say that, is that we have a promise from God that things won't always be as they are now. There is something else coming, new heavens and a new earth, where the bad days won't happen anymore, and we won't dwell on the bad days we've had.

When we look at the news and see that the world is in pain, there are a lot of bad days happening for people right now all across the globe. Reminding people that better days are to come isn't always the most helpful thing in the moment, it's also not a call to be complacent and just let bad things happen. God promises us that in the future there will be a place of no weeping, no crying, just joy, as Christians we can strive to try and emulate that as best we can for people in their lives now.

Are there things we can do to help people when they're having a bad day?

Perhaps if we can help people turn a bad day into a good day, they can then have a better understanding of what God's promise actually means.

Reflections on the readings

The following reflection and questions are inspired by the hymn 226 STF – Have you Heard God's Voice. Either speak or sing each verse between each section.

Our world is becoming increasingly polarised. There are divisions growing deeper and wider in both our local communities and in the world. Our world is trying to grow on division rather than unity – leading to fractures tearing apart any political decision and any mistake or action, and leading to anger and fear among many.

But how do we as a church respond? How can we be a voice of hope among the hatred that seems to be growing louder and louder.

Verse 1

Have you heard God's voice; has your heart been stirred? Are you still prepared to follow? Have you made a choice to remain and serve, Though the way be rough and narrow?

Hearing God's voice is one thing, but to make the commitment to follow God and do what God calls is another. When living in a world that is becoming increasingly polarised it can be hard to keep hold of hope in God when the world seems hopeless. We are being asked if we are still prepared to follow – as people who follow Jesus, we are called to follow, live by example and work for righteousness. Practicing justice, mercy and humility aren't easy but when responding to God's call it is something we are committing to trying to live by. Unlike the church in Thessalonica where idleness was rife, we are called to be active in our faith and through our actions try and enact justice, mercy and humility.

Question for discussion, in groups or as a whole congregation. You could invite people to talk in pairs for a few minutes and share any specific outcomes.

What might living with justice, mercy and humility look like in your community and church? Verse 2

In your city streets will you be God's heart? Will you listen to the voiceless? Will you stop and eat, and when friendships start, Will you share your faith with the faithless?

God calls us to stand firm in our faith and not be misled by the world around us. Politics and Christianity are becoming increasingly intertwined with the label of Christianity being used against values such as racism which don't align with Methodist values. When our faith is being used to bully and create fear – what words do we speak?

In our passage from Luke, Jesus instructs his disciples to stand firm in their faith in times of trials and also comforts his disciples with a promise that the words we need to speak will be provided to us. As we look at the life and actions of Jesus, we can also see that the words we need to speak are shown to us through the love and compassion that Jesus shared. It is holding onto the hope and love that we know through Jesus that can be our motivator to stand firm in our faith. It is not our role to judge but our role is to love and express kindness through the foundation of our faith.

Question for discussion, in groups or as a whole congregation. You could invite people to talk in pairs for a few minutes and share any specific outcomes.

How do we stand firm in our faith when our faith is being labelled as something causing harm?

Verse 3

Will you watch the news with the eyes of faith, and believe it could be different?
Will you share your views using words of grace?
Will you leave a thoughtful imprint?

Imagine a world in which the world's sins and transgressions were all forgotten, where the sound of weeping and crying were no longer heard and relationships will be restored with one another. At the end of all the fearful wars and storms that Jesus describes in our passage from Luke, we see where God is wanting his people to get to – to unity.

This passage was written for a group of people who had lived under oppression. Their children died of malnutrition and their labour was exploited to build the homes of the oppressors. This passage promises them that their children will live, that they will build

houses that they will live in – it speaks of a world without people being taken advantage of or being oppressed. It speaks of unity and peace.

But an important thing to note is that at no point does the passage say that one group is right and one is wrong. In our polarised world, it is easy to sit on one fence and stare at the other, arguing about why they are wrong, and you are right. It is easy to join in with the polarisation. But this passage gives us the image of the wolf and lamb feeding together, the lion eating straw. That is not a image of one being right and the other being wrong, but rather each side learning to live together in harmony.

This doesn't mean that we need to agree but instead of a culture of right and wrong and cancelling and hating, we can look towards a community of hope. A community where people sit and discuss, wanting to engage in a conversation of understanding and hope rather than leaping into defensiveness. A community that prioritises love over hate.

Question for discussion, in groups or as a whole congregation. You could invite people to talk in pairs for a few minutes and share any specific outcomes.

What steps might you be able to take to bring a glimmer of hope into your community?4

For the work of world leaders – We pray a prayer of hope

For the warming oceans – We pray a prayer of hope

For those struggling with their mental health – We pray a prayer of hope

For the destruction of habitats – We pray a prayer of hope

For those fleeing their homes – We pray a prayer of hope

For those who are being misled – We pray a prayer of hope

For those who fear the unknown – We pray a prayer of hope

For those feeling desperate – We pray a prayer of hope
