"If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit"

– John 15:5

Nicola's Letter One The Gospel writer, John, describes the first Easter over 2000 years ago: "Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark...". The first day of the

week. The first day of something new. At this stage, Mary Magdalene, who arrives at the tomb, doesn't realise just how transformative that something new will be. "While it was still dark" – notice how the language points us to the bleakness of Mary's grief and lack of understanding.

Let's home in on Mary's point of view: She was there at the foot of Jesus' cross. She was there as his mother and the other women wept. I imagine she was there as the body was taken down, wrapped in cloths, and sealed up in the tomb. What did she feel as the stone was rolled into place? Can you imagine? Can you imagine the terrible darkness?

It is the darkness that eradicates hope. A suffocating, creeping darkness that erodes any belief in the future. It's the darkness of death. It's the darkness of illness. It's the darkness of struggle. It's bleak. It's desolate.

And yet... there is a competition going on in, in this first line: "Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark..."

Darkness dominates, but we are also alerted to the fact that dawn is coming – a powerful thought, worth tenaciously holding on to in those times and places when we wrestle with grief, illness and struggle.

Yes – darkness might surround Mary and each one of us at times – but with God, dawn will break through. Dawn always comes, following even the darkest, most desolate nights. Yes – the night hours are hard and long, but nothing can stop dawn.Just as with Mary at the tomb, in our lives and across the world, there are many situations and experiences which are deeply painful and frightening. Ill-health, grief, isolation, poverty, racism, ongoing wars, the climate crisis, all can create darkness and despair.

And yet, God calls us to trust that even when we cannot see or feel it ourselves, God never, ever leaves us. God is right there with us, going through it all with us. God is with us, nurturing new life from the very seeds of pain and fear. This is an utterly transforming hope which we can hold onto, and share, in the darkest times and places, at Easter and beyond.

Presbyteral Ministry at Christ Church LEP

Currently, Christ Church is fortunate to be served through 25% of Revd Edward's Circuit time and 25% of Revd Nicola's Partnership time. In July 2025, Rev. Nicola's term with us will have come to an end (though not in the Partnership) as will Rev. Edward's with us and the Circuit. Extensions to these terms are possible but not guaranteed and some reorganisation may take place. Work is ongoing within the Leeds URC Partnership and the Leeds North and East Methodist Circuit, to make plans as to how ministry time might be allocated to all the churches involved.

The Leeds URC Partnership is made up of 8 churches, including ours. Presently, there are 2 Stipendiary ministers, 2 Non stipendiary ministers and 1 Elder in local leadership in the Ministry Team. In the near future, the 2 non-stipendiary ministers will be stepping back from the team. Currently, the Partnership is looking to call another stipendiary minister into the team. To aid this process, each church is producing a profile to suggest ways we might support and be supported by another minister being in the team, whether or not they have responsibility for our church.

Meanwhile, the recent Methodist Circuit meeting voted to reduce the number of Presbyters from 5 to 4 though it was also agreed that each church would continue to have a presbyter with pastoral charge. Thus, four Presbyters will have pastoral charge of 14 churches. This is in order to work towards a balanced budget and also address the national shortage of Ministers. As a church this means we will be asked to feedback ways in which we think the workload on Presbyters can be reduced. Options may include joint services, flexible service times and some lay post holder job sharing across churches to free up time for some to train in lay pastoral roles.

Please do appreciate that the details will take time to be worked through but we will discuss and share information when we are able. In the meantime Revds Nicola and Edward and our Stewards will aim to answer any questions you may have, so not hesitate to get in touch. We are here to listen and chat. We also ask for your continued prayers and support as we journey forward together. - **Helen Lappage**

When our mission engagements are in such a direction, we are truly serving Christ the love. Church is all about serving in love in the community, outside the walls of our church building, particularly vulnerable people. No one has ever seen God, but if we love one another, God lives in us, the Easter story becomes relevant and God's love is perfected in the creation."

Reduce – Reuse – Recycle

If you're looking for some new, clever ways to help save the planet, why not try some of these ideas?

- Don't throw it out, repair it! From bikes, to sewing machines, to laptops and anywhere in between, the volunteers at a Repair Café might be able to fix it for you. On the third Saturday of every month, 11am-3pm, the East Leeds Repair Café is held at Cross Gates Methodist Church.
- Did you know empty crisp packets can be recycled into things like flooring and fence posts? You can save your packets and drop them off at the Whitkirk Co-Op or Sainsburys at Colton for recycling.
- No need to use chemicals to clean and freshen your microwave. Pop some lemon slices in a bowl of water and heat until the inside of the microwave is steamy, then just wipe down inside.
- Nice and simple cut down your energy use by switching appliances off at the socket. You'd be surprised how many still use energy even when you think they're turned off.
- Tea bags are actually full of plastic. Switch to loose-leaf tea or plastic-free bags which are more biodegradable.

Colton Church Annual General Meeting Update

Our meeting took place on Sunday 17 March after worship over a welcome cuppa, chaired by Revd Becki. Minutes of the meeting will be circulated shortly but the main points from the meeting were:

- **Church Stewards:** Elaine, Kathryn, Sijmen and Frank all agreed to continue as church stewards which the meeting agreed to!
- **Representatives to Church Council:** it was noted there are a number of vacancies on Church Council, so if this is something you'd like to explore, please speak to Becki or one of the stewards. The reps who were due to stand down this year agreed to continue for a further 3 years. Mary Curl volunteered to return to Church Council and this was welcomed.
- Church Reports: A document containing reports from the Minister, Treasurer, Senior Stewards, Pastoral Visitors, Junior Church & Wednesday Coffee Morning had been circulated prior to the meeting. A short time was spent in small groups to pick out any highlights and feedback. Thanks were expressed to all those submitting the reports and those involved in all the various roles to support the work of the church in Colton.
- Church Charity of the Year: after discussion it was agreed that our main fundraising from September 2024 to August 2025 should be for a Colton Methodist Church Repair and Renew Fund, due to the level of property related work required, alongside the continued collection of items for the Foodbank and Meeting Point.
- **Circuit News:** a summary of items discussed at the recent Circuit Meeting was passed on, including the decision to reduce the number of presbyters from 5 to 4 from September 2025.
- The Way Ahead for Colton: a sheet summarising the new priorities for Colton was circulated with the reports. These had been accepted by Church Council and the AGM welcomed these. Two new JAM (Jesus And Me) initiatives are in the pipeline one to follow on from Wednesday Coffee Morning fortnightly and the other geared to families with children 12 and under, to take place monthly on a Sunday afternoon.

"Cries of Distress" From Our Daily Bread

Trapped under two floors of collapsed rubble caused by an earthquake, five-year-old Jinan, a Syrian girl, called out to rescuers as she shielded her little brother from the debris surrounding them. "Get me out of here; I'll do anything for you," she called heartbreakingly. "I'll be your servant."

Cries of distress are found throughout the Psalms: "When hard pressed, I cried to the Lord" (Psalm 118:5). While we may never experience the crushing weight of earthquake-collapsed buildings, we all recognise the suffocating fears from a challenging medical diagnosis, economic hardship, uncertainty about the future or relational loss.

In those moments we may offer bargains to God for deliverance. But God doesn't need to be persuaded to help. He promises to answer, and while it may not be relief from our situation, He'll be with us and on our side. Nor do we need to



fear any other peril—including death. We can say with the psalmist, "The Lord is with me; he is my helper. I look in triumph on my enemies" (v. 7).

We're not promised as dramatic a rescue as Jinan and her brother experienced, but we can trust our faithful God, who brought the psalmist "into a spacious place" (v. 5). He knows our situation and He'll never abandon us, even in death.

How has God shown Himself faithful when you're in distress? How have you recognised his presence during difficult times?
