## **Covenant and Clay**

As we get stuck in to a new year, Methodists in many places will have been saying the very special Covenant prayer together. It's a prayer in which we offer ourselves to God, in response to God's faithfulness to us, and we recommit to following where God will lead us in the months ahead.

The prayer itself isn't easy to pray, but the bit that follows is probably harder, as we try to put into practise those good things we've prayed about.

It was a real privilege for me in January to explore the Covenant prayer and an image from the biblical prophet Jeremiah of God being like a potter, with us being clay, with a group of families.

After we heard the Bible story, we set to creating some things out of clay for ourselves, and together talking about what we think it means that God is the potter and we like clay.

Since I'm an avid fan of The Great Pottery Throw Down, I greeted the task with relish! But, sadly, however many hours I may have spent watching amateur potters creating beautiful things, I do not seem to have magically gained the talent required to make something I could feel proud of from the raw clay!

But this isn't a surprise is it? We know that if we're going to see change in something, be it a slab of clay or the world we live in, we have to work at

it, work with it, and spend time and energy getting involved, putting our hands to the task.

In the same way, we must, I think, be ready to allow God to be hands-on with us. Perhaps sometimes we're like that fresh cut lump of clay that resists being moulded, but holding all manner of unexplored potential until God moulds us and shapes us into all we're called to be.

This year, I wonder what you are being called to get hands on with and stuck into?

## **Connexional Funds**

# There are several funds held at connexional level. Here we have explained some more.

The Fund for the Support of Presbyters and Deacons (FSPD) is the main benevolent fund held at the connexional level. The fund aims to support supernumeraries; surviving spouses/partners of deceased ministers, and active ministers (including students and probationers) in financial difficulty or needing help due to illness or incapacity with their return to work. Whilst the fund has benefitted from very generous support in the past, the calls on this fund increase year on year. The Connexional Allowances Committee that administers the fund is very grateful for all donations received to this, and the other benevolent funds they oversee.

The Methodist Medical Benevolent Fund (MMBF) is to assist ministers, lay employees and their dependants cover costs of health-related (medical) services. These purposes can also be met from the FSPD (with the exception of support to lay employees) and in practice, this fund typically supports counselling and recuperative breaks. Since 2022 the MMBF has also started providing support to helps ministers' children in need (often as adults themselves), in particular because of incapacity or disability, mental or physical, temporary or ongoing. These needs were previously met from the Methodist Ministers' Children's Relief Association. However, as that fund became fully depleted and income mostly from the traditional collections at District Synods reduced, the MMBF has taken over funding these grants.

Other benevolent funds exist that are funded from historic investments specifically to support the educational needs of minsters' children, and to support members of the Methodist Diaconal Order.

The Fund for Training helps fund the provision of initial and further training for presbyters, deacons, lay employees and other lay persons. It also provides grants for students and training institutions.

The Fund for Property exists to support the work of the trustees of Methodist property including grants and loans for property purposes. Historically, grants were made for property projects across the connexion. However, with dwindling funds available and changes to the approach to grant giving, this fund is now overseen by the Property Development Committee. It provides grants to managing trustees for feasibility studies in the initial phases of property projects.

## Spotlight on..... Keith Tingle

How do you condense 90 years into one short article? Well, I've tried so for anyone interested this is the life of Keith Tingle in 760 words. I'm a Leeds lad born and bred. A Yorkshire man through and through. Life started in 1934 when I was born in Hunslet to parents Alice and Clifford. My mother was a dressmaker whilst my father worked as a twister in a local woollen mill and we lived in the mill cottages with my eldest sister Brenda and then my younger sisters Evelyn and Dianne before moving to Lower Wortley.

They were happy times, attending Sunday School at Whingate Methodist Church, joining in with their many social events, playing cricket for the church, and the highlight always our annual family holiday to the East Coast. I was also a member of the Scouts and remember one camp, when our usual van driver was not available at the last minute so, not to be deterred, we pushed all the equipment on a handcart from Whingate Junction to Harewood Farm.

As I became older I took a Saturday job as a butchers boy, cycling round in all weathers with a big basket on my bike delivering meat. Perhaps it was all this cycling that prompted me and a friend to get on our bikes and visit his Auntie in Liverpool.

In 1947 my Uncle Arthur took me by train to Wembley to see Leeds play Bradford Northern in the Rugby League Challenge Cup final.

Unfortunately Leeds lost 4-8 but that didn't stop me from becoming a life long Leeds fan and a season ticket holder for many, many years.

Despite the many hours I had spent as a child under the dining table, sat in a box practising to be a train driver, after leaving school I joined the accounts department at Soapy Joes on Whitehall Road and attended night school to pass my accountancy exams.

My 2 years National Service was spent in the RAF where I was stationed in Germany working in air traffic control.

My sister Evelyn had begun working for the Yorkshire Electricity Board and she took me to one of their dances where she introduced me to a friend of hers, Jean. As they say, the rest is history. We married in 1957 and moved into a house in Knightsway where I have lived ever since. The 60's blessed us with 2 beautiful daughters Deborah and Beverley and they attended Sunday School at Crossgates Methodist Church where Jean and I had started to worship. In the 70's I moved with Soapy Joe's, now Elida Gibbs, to their new home on the Coal Road in Seacroft before moving on to work at Europower Hydraulics in Market Weighton. We considered moving house but, Jean and I had become heavily involved in the life of the church and the girls were both busy with their activities and friends, so I decided to give commuting a try. It can't have been too bad as I stayed there until I retired in 1992. In 1981 I was seconded to a company in Winston Salem, North Carolina for a year which was an amazing experience.

Over the years I have held a variety of roles at Church from treasurer, gift aid secretary, stewardship recorder, circuit finance steward and treasurer, a member of the counting team and heating rota to property odd job man and DIY specialist.

When the Church Rambling Club started, I would say that brought a new lease of life to Jean and myself. We had always enjoyed an afternoon on Armscliffe Crag or Otley Chevin with the girls but now we had got the walking bug! Saturdays were made for waterproofs and muddy boots, rucksacks and sandwiches visiting some wonderful places and making great friendships along the way.

The 90's heralded the growth of our family when Jean and I became the proud grandparents of five gorgeous girls. After a lifetime surrounded by women, 3 sisters, 2 daughters and 5 granddaughters my first great grandchild arrived last August, and yes, she was a delightful baby girl. After retiring I used some of my spare time to take up another hobby, singing. I have sung with West Ardsley, Middleton and then Leeds Male Voice Choirs.

Sadly I ended up spending several years caring for Jean after her dementia diagnosis and then my strokes put an end to any involvement in my remaining church roles however I am grateful that I can still attend services regularly.

Life may have slowed down but as I sit here on my 90<sup>th</sup> birthday and look back and ponder, I am so grateful for the many wonderful people who have passed through my life. You know who you are!
