Nicola's Letter

Light In the Darkness

I'm writing this letter just before 4 o'clock and it's getting dark already! At this time of the

year in the UK, we often only have 7 or 8 hours of daylight every day. Oh, how it makes me crave the long, light nights of summer.

However, this darkness pales in comparison when we acknowledge the darkness of the news: where we see and hear the ongoing wars and conflicts; the destructiveness of climate change, the suffering of refugees on unsafe boats and in camps or hotels. There is also the darkness in our lives: in the midst of illness and grief; poverty, cuts in disability benefits.

And yet in our darkness, God will meet us there. In our darkness, God is present. A God of faith, hope and love. A God revealed in Jesus. A God who intimately understands our vulnerability because Jesus came to earth a helpless new-born baby.

Two thousand years ago, Jesus was born into a world characterised by the occupation and oppression of the Roman Empire. An Empire which impacted on so many parts of a person's life and must have felt like it could last forever.

We talk about Jesus' coming into the world, as light shining in darkness. The light of Jesus reveals how darkness in our lives and world can be overcome. To quote one of the Gospel writers, John: "The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not overcome it".

Christmas is about Jesus Christ entering the pain and darkness of every time and place, including ours, to bring light. A light of faith, hope and love that each and every one of us, can share with our families, our communities, our world.

So, my hope and prayer is that Jesus' light can provide each and every one of us with peace and hope this Christmas.

A Greener, More Eco-Friendly Christmas From the Methodist Church Website

1) Buy less


6 Jan: we welcome the New Year with a fish & chip supper, and Paul Kaufman, who you may remember from last year, entertains us with a great quiz.

Remembering

I hesitated to send a Christmas card to a dear old woman whom I hadn't heard from, or seen, in twenty years, and who was reported to have been suffering from geriatric depression for some time. Though 3,000 miles away I remembered her as a source of easy affection, great inclusive smiles and a natural and generous warmth. I wrote a few lines telling her how I still held onto vivid memories of her goodness and how I remembered with thanks the buoyancy she lent to my life in the past. In the days before Christmas I learned from my sister that this woman had died in her sleep at the age of ninety-four. She had received a phone call from the woman's son with the news of her death. The son asked my sister to pass on to me his thanks for sending his mother that Christmas card. He had opened it and read it to his mother in her bed who had smiled broadly and been joyfully pleased to be remembered by me. She died within a few days of being read my Christmas card. Not only am I deeply glad that I sent that Christmas card but hearing of the small pleasure it brought her near the end of her time on this earth I remember it as the finest Christmas present I could ever hope to receive.


