

#### All Age Talk

Today is one of those important Sundays in the life of the church. In fact, you could even say it's the part one of the finale of the season that is Easter!

Like any good part one of a finale, let us recap what has happened so far (during the retelling, add to each part what you did within your own community as a way of grounding the narrative):

• We started with Lent, which starts just after Shrove Tuesday or Pancake Day, a time where Jesus wandered around for 40 days and 40 nights, resisting temptation from the enemy. We remember this by giving up chocolate, sweets, Facebook or something else for those 40 days.

• Next, we have Palm Sunday! A time where Jesus entered Jerusalem, riding a donkey, to crowds of people waving palms and praising his name! We all received palm crosses that day to remind ourselves of that day.

• Jesus then performs a few small miracles and questions some church leaders who challenge his authority. That small miracle is sometimes known as "The Cursing of the Fig Tree."

• We are then brought to Maundy Thursday. A time when Jesus gathered the disciples together for the Last Supper. The night in which he was betrayed. A night we also remember a lot in church as it forms the basis of what Communion is.

• Good Friday is the day when Jesus died on the cross. It's a sad day, but we know what came after....

• Easter Sunday! Jesus is resurrected! The women in the garden went and told the disciples that he was alive, the stone was rolled away, the tomb was empty!

Phew! We're all caught up! Between Easter Sunday and now, Jesus has slowly been presenting himself to select people to prove he is alive. Remember the story of Thomas, or Doubting Thomas? That's one of the times Jesus proved he was alive. In all these times, Jesus talked with and shared ideas with his friends as to what the Kingdom of God would be like. But in all these conversations Jesus stressed to his disciples that they shouldn't leave Jerusalem. I like to think that Jesus is like a friend who's trying to get you to stay because they know there is a surprise for you, but don't want to ruin the surprise!

Yet... Jesus does spoil the surprise, but the disciples are too focused on what else Jesus says:

Read Acts 1: 4-11, ideally in a translation like the Good News that is easy for children and young people in the congregation to follow.

Jesus ascended to Heaven, hence why we call this Sunday "Ascension Sunday" and in the process teased the disciples and us with what is coming next in the second part of the Easter Season Finale: The Holy Spirit.

Let us pray:

Lord God, help us to be patient and alert to the coming of the Holy Spirit, and thank you for the inspiration that is Jesus in our lives.

#### **Reflections on the readings**

Today's reflection comes to us from Graeme Dutton, a Methodist minister in Bradford. He says:

When it comes to films, I love a good historical epic. I can remember lazy Sunday afternoons spent watching the likes of Ben Hur, El Cid and The Vikings with my dad. We've seen them that many times that it's become a running joke in our family. 'Hey, Mom, there's a film on ITV4 called El Cid, I think Dad might like it!'

I love the newer 'classics' too. That first scene in Gladiator when Maximus gives his speech before battle is incredible, 'what we do in life, echoes in eternity.' What a brilliant motivation! Talking of motivation the speech by William Wallace to his troops before the battle of Stirling in 'Braveheart' is even better.

It follows a great bit of comedy interplay when the soldiers who have gathered don't believe that Wallace is who he says he is because, amongst other things, 'he's no tall enough.' William's response that if he were really William Wallace he'd 'consume the English with fire balls from his eyes and bolts of lightening from..', well, from somewhere else, leads to much laughter. He does then assure the gathered troops he is who he says he is and inspires them with those immortal words 'dying in your beds, many years from now, would you be willin' to trade ALL the days, from this day to that,

for one chance, just one chance, to come back here and tell our enemies that they may take our lives, but they'll never take... OUR FREEDOM!'

In our Gospel reading today, Jesus, is also in top motivational form. He begins by ensuring that his disciples know exactly who he is. He reminds them of everything he has told them and everything they have seen and experienced while they have been journeying with him. He then tells them that they are the witnesses who are going to be tasked with taking the message of salvation from Jerusalem to the ends of the earth. However, before they begin that work there's another gift for them that will build them up and assist them in their mission. The gift of God's Holy Spirit.

Of course we know that both the mission and the gift are not the sole reserve of those first disciples but are both ours to claim as followers of Christ.

As Jesus blesses his disciples and ascends into heaven, he sets in motion the continuation of his work. The fact that this story is repeated to the early church in the first chapter of Acts, just seeks to emphasise that the baton has been passed on. The Holy Spirt is coming, not just for those first disciples but for everyone who claims to be a follower of Jesus. If we are willing to take part in that work we are not simply left to do so in our strength, but will be gifted the helper in order that we are never alone.

I often make use of the Methodist Worship Book when I'm leading pastoral services such as baptisms and weddings. One of my favourite things about the liturgy in those services, and indeed many of the others included in the book, is that whenever anyone is asked to make a promise, the response they give is always 'with God's help I/We will.' There is a recognition built into the way that we respond that we can make no real promise to God without his help.

That knowledge of God's help to us, through the Holy Spirit, promised by Jesus at the moment of his ascension to heaven can be a source of great confidence to us. As we seek to be faithful people, living out a life of hope, we can cling to that promise in the face of challenge and opposition. In a world that can sometimes seem hostile to the message of the church it helps us to remember that while we have a mission to be part of, it is God who is always in control. We join him in making known his Spirit in the world.

Questions for reflection on your own for a minute or two, and then to discuss in groups of three. [Let people know when their minute of reflection time is up, and you may have to facilitate the time in groups a little to ensure people are not excluded. If possible, display the questions on the screen, or pause people after 5-8 minutes of conversation and remind them of the questions. Overall, allow 10-15 minutes for conversation in groups, then bring people back together to sing].

- What's the best piece of motivational advice I've ever heard?
- How did it feel when you first heard it?
- What's the best motivational advice you think you can give to someone else?
- Where have you seen God's Spirit at work in your life this week? This month? This year?
- What new thing might you try and do 'with God's help' in the coming weeks?<sup>4</sup>
